# 4. Community Justice selfevaluation process

- It was noted that there will be a requirement to maintain the 'Community Options' guidance.

MW provided some background to the expectation that Community Justice partnerships evaluate their own performance. He has looked at how other partnerships have undertaken this process. Highland CJP has done an annual review using a questionnaire for the past two years and MW considered this the most comprehensive of those he had seen.

It was agreed that MW would issue a questionnaire based on Highland's. The partnership would consider how to proceed once the survey had been completed and analysed.

Cllr Creswell reported back on the CJS Chairs event that she had attended in Glasgow on 23 September 2019. There was a discussion about the effectiveness of the current rotating arrangements.

MW asked members to give some thought to changing the chairing arrangements and that if anybody was interested in taking on the Chair on a permanent basis, they should contact him. The selection of a permanent Chair would need to be agreed by the Partnership and require an amendment to the Partnership's constitution.

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### 5. Youth Justice

In JT's absence, TR referred to the latest quarter's statistics. As in previous years, there had been an increase in the number of referrals over the school summer holiday period but numbers had since returned to their usual levels.

## 6. Partners updates

#### **Scottish Fire & Rescue Service**

The 'Safe drive, stay alive' road safety event had recently been delivered in Aberdeen to school pupils from Moray. JD commended this longstanding event as it had a positive impact on the young people who attended it.

#### **Clir Creswell**

Cllr Creswell explained that work was underway to create collection points for the Forres Credit Union in Elgin and Buckie.

#### tsiMoray

JM explained that voting was about to open on #YouChoose4 with around 50 community projects bidding for their share of £40K funding under the themes of 'Be Healthy' and 'Connecting Communities'. Voting closes on 9 December.

#### Moray Alcohol & Drug Partnership

Work was ongoing to ensure that the 'no wrong door' approach was applied consistently across drug & alcohol and mental health

services. The contracts for services provided by Penumbra and Quarriers were coming to an end and it was important that the new contracts addressed service access to meet these requirements.

#### **Housing Services**

CC described the work being undertaken as part of the Rapid Rehousing initiative. This requires that services are built around tenants to help them sustain their tenancies. It was planned to offer 20 'Housing First' supported tenancies over the next two years.

The Royal Hotel in Forres was no longer used by Housing and the emphasis was now on using dispersed accommodation.

There was a discussion about prison liaison arrangements and CC reported that very few people leaving prison present unannounced at Housing Need.

#### **Families Outside**

CC explained that the awareness raising event described in the latest progress report had been delivered to 42 Education staff at Beechbrae on 11 November, in conjunction with SPS.

CC was currently visiting prisons across Scotland to promote the availability of 'virtual visits' for prisoners from Moray, via the video link at the Inverness Family Centre.

CC reminded partners that the MFR 'Cash for Kids' initiative is open if they wished to nominate any families or young people for an award.

#### **Scottish Prison Service**

HMP Inverness staff participated in the 'Courage of our Convictions' employability event held in Inverness on 7 November. Fewer employers involved than anticipated, further event to be planned.

An educational award event had been held within HMP Inverness, with a video link to the Visitor Centre.

There was a discussion on arrangements that had been put in place following the suspension of the SPS Throughcare Support Service, with Shine and New Routes expanding their service access criteria to accommodate more clients. The Scottish Government (Community Justice Division) is seeking information from localities to assess the impact of the withdrawal of this service by SPS.

#### **Elgin Street Pastors**
